# 2021 NSW Post-School Destinations and Experiences Survey

This fact sheet provides a high-level overview of findings from the 2021 NSW Post-School Destinations and Experiences Survey relating to all NSW recent school leavers, including early school leavers and Year 12 completers.


In 2021, a total of 42,388 school leavers completed the survey.

# Post-school destinations of all school leavers in 2021

In 2021, 90.5% of all school leavers were in education, training or employment. The remainder were either looking for work or not in the labour force, education or training (NILFET).




The proportion of recent school leavers involved in higher education, training or employment was significantly higher in 2021 than in any previous year of the survey, except for 2018.

#### **Top 3 post-school work roles** for school leavers:

down 1.1 pp\*

from 2020

1. Sales assistants and salespersons (18.3%)

down 3.5 pp\*

from 2020

- 2. Hospitality workers (15.9%)
- 3. Storepersons (10.3%)

**Note.** Changes in percentage points accompanied by an asterisk (\*) are statistically significant at a 99% confidence level (p<.01). Statistical significance is determined by both the size of the groups being compared and the percentage point difference between them.
