

Key information for the Visual Arts Stage 6 syllabus (2016)

- Schools and teachers use syllabuses to develop educational programs for students. The <u>Visual</u> <u>Arts Stage 6 Syllabus (2016)</u> requires students to investigate Artmaking 50% and Art Criticism and Art History 50% over 240 hours.
- Visual Arts Stage 6 specific course requirements are outlined in the <u>Visual Arts Stage 6 Syllabus (2016)</u> including Preliminary and HSC course components.
- Schools are required to develop school-based assessment programs for each of the Preliminary and HSC courses. School-based assessment requirements are outlined at <u>Assessment and</u> <u>Reporting in Visual Arts in Stage 6</u>.

HSC Examinations

- The HSC Visual Arts examination involves both a written exam and submitted artwork. Details on the HSC Visual Arts examination can be found at <u>Assessment and</u> <u>Reporting in Visual Arts in Stage 6</u>. The written examination is a 1 hour and 30 minutes examination paper, consisting of 2 sections (totalling 50 marks / weighting 50%).
- The Body of Work (50 marks/ weighting 50%) student submission should demonstrate the understanding of artmaking as a practice representing students' ideas and interests. Body of work examination criteria reflects on conceptual strength and meaning, and resolution. See <u>HSC</u> <u>Visual Arts Marking Guidelines – Artmaking – Body of work</u>.
- The body of work must comply with the prescribed dimensions for HSC submitted artworks as set out in NESA advice regarding content and certifying works in <u>Practical</u> <u>exam rules</u> and <u>Certifying HSC practical component</u>.
- Past HSC papers by NESA help students to become familiar with the examination format and structure. Past papers for Stage 6 Visual Arts can be found at <u>Visual Arts 2024 exam</u> pack and include marking centre notes for Body of Work submissions and written examinations.
- HSC standards materials by NESA provide a collection of resources of sample responses typical of work at the boundaries between HSC bands. The <u>Visual Arts Stage 6</u> <u>standards material</u> can be found on the NESA webpages.

General HSC information

- The <u>NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA)</u> oversees the Higher School Certificate (HSC), offering resources for students on exam preparation, course selection, and academic integrity.
- The <u>NESA HSC glossary</u> provides teachers with guidance on how to use key terms consistently, ensuring students understand their meanings and apply them appropriately across various subjects for effective exam preparation.
- The NESA <u>HSC assessment moderation</u> process ensures fairness by adjusting school assessment marks based on exam results, making them comparable across schools.
- The <u>ACE rules</u> outline HSC school-based assessment integrity, task development, marking, appeals, and record-keeping. They cover malpractice policies, illness/ misadventure procedures, task notifications, ranking, and restrictions on reporting final marks, ensuring compliance with NESA's assessment standards.
- HSC monitoring advice, Section 1.6 outlines HSC recordkeeping requirements, including teaching programs, assessment documentation, interventions and work samples. Visit <u>Stage 6-monitoring implementation and</u> <u>support</u> for more information.
- School-based assessment for the HSC contributes to a student's final mark and is designed to evaluate students' understanding and skills based on syllabus outcomes.
