NSW Government Action Plan: 2021

The NSW Higher Education Strategy (the Strategy) will drive strong and effective partnerships between government and the higher education sector.

The NSW Department of Education will work across government and with the sector to deliver on the Strategy's vision: NSW Government is partnering with universities and other higher education providers in bold and innovative ways to address social, economic and environmental challenges, both locally and globally.



- Launched a comprehensive NSW Higher Education Strategy, co-designed with the sector.
- Established new mechanisms to engage with the university sector on the Strategy and a Cross-Government Steering Group to ensure a collaborative approach to its implementation.
- Undertaken a comprehensive environmental scan of priority projects currently underway between NSW Government and the sector.
 Universities and government agencies are already engaged in a wide range of partnerships and collaborative programs that will progress the Strategy's outcomes.
- Designed and launched the NSW Collaboration and Innovation Fund, which will support new, sector-led projects throughout the life of the Strategy.



This document outlines specific initiatives the NSW Government will progress to support the actions under each of the five priority areas in the Higher Education Strategy. This includes:

- Delivering on existing commitments and working across government to ensure that these initiatives align to outcomes in the Strategy.
- Progressing new projects. For example, new procurement policies, a new Collaboration and Innovation Fund, scoping new work-integrated learning opportunities and piloting innovative new models of education.
- Identifying gaps or opportunities. Themed roundtables with stakeholders will identify new ideas and opportunities and undertake research and policy development.

This Action Plan focuses on initiatives that will be primarily driven by the NSW Government. It is acknowledged that across universities and higher education providers in NSW there is a range of activity, investment and collaboration underway that contributes to the Strategy's vision.

Priority Area 1: Develop and broaden post-school options to foster lifelong learning

People at all ages and career stages should be able to easily navigate the tertiary education system and access valuable qualifications that will help them achieve their career and education goals. With the emergence of new technologies and industries, it is crucial that all learners are equipped with the knowledge and skills they need to adapt and be successful in a changing world.

Higher education, VET and industry are key partners in supporting these students. The NSW Government will support and facilitate new partnerships and the development of innovative education models that will deliver the education and training our citizens need now and into the future.

Case Studies

Institutes of Applied
Technology:
trialling new and innovative
forms of education

The Institute of Applied Technology (IAT) will be a new model of tertiary education that fully integrates the theoretical study of university with the practical training of vocational education. IATs are a key recommendation from the Review on the NSW Vocational Education and Training sector, led by Professor Peter Shergold AC and Mr David Gonski AC.

The IAT model described in the report involves close collaboration between

registered training organisations, universities and industry to design and deliver courses that integrate practical employability skills with theoretical knowledge. It is envisaged that curriculum will be focused on NSW's emerging labour market needs.

The NSW Government will pilot the IAT model at TAFE sites in Meadowbank and Kingswood and a regional site to be determined.


DCJ Scholarships Program: supporting young people to continue and complete their studies The Department of Communities and Justice Scholarships program assists young people living in social housing and in out-of-home care who are enrolled in education or training to complete their studies by offering \$1,000 to help with educational expenses and secondary support services. Students in high school in Years 10, 11 and 12 may apply.

Students are able to receive continued funding for up to seven years as long as they remain in education and are still a social housing client.

Priority Area 2: Ensure wider participation in quality higher education

Higher education positively impacts the lives of our citizens. However, participation by students from equity groups and underrepresented regions is lower than for those from other backgrounds. Studying at university can be a transformative process, delivering tangible and long-term benefits for individuals and their communities.

The NSW Government will work with the sector to provide opportunities for all domestic students, no matter their background, to access higher education. Collaborative initiatives and programs that support achievement, aspiration, access and transition to higher education will be essential to this outcome.





Priority Area 3: Drive job growth, skills and innovation

The higher education sector is integral to the NSW economy. The sector educates highly-skilled graduates, drives employment, innovation, entrepreneurship, industry collaborations, and contributes to Gross State Product. NSW Government and higher education providers will be key partners in addressing emerging challenges from COVID-19 and harnessing shared opportunities to develop a highly-skilled workforce in a rapidly changing world.

Leveraging higher education expertise and industry collaborations will be essential to move towards the goals of the NSW 2040 Economic Blueprint. To meet these, NSW will implement activities focused on reskilling and upskilling our citizens, driving precincts that encourage collaboration and the growth of start-ups, and utilising the expertise of our world class universities.

Priority Area 4: Strengthen collaborations to bolster research outcomes


NSW is home to world class research institutions. A strong, vibrant and high-quality research ecosystem is critical to driving the prosperity of NSW. Research translation delivers the new ideas, products and skills needed to address complex issues and improve social, economic and environmental outcomes for NSW.

The NSW Government will deliver initiatives to harness these strengths and translate research outcomes for public benefit. This includes building stronger research collaborations, working more closely on shared priorities, and partnering to attract a larger portion of Commonwealth Government research funding opportunities to NSW.

With the establishment of R&D NSW and the implementation of the Turning Ideas into Jobs: Accelerating research and development in NSW Action Plan, further collaborative opportunities to drive research translation and support future industries will be developed throughout the life of the Strategy.

Case Studies

Research and Innovation Networks: bringing the experts together Funded and supported by Investment NSW, the Networks aim to build on the state's existing research and industry strengths, and drive innovation in sectors of strategic importance to NSW through collaborations between businesses, universities and government.

Four Networks have been established: the Smart Sensing Network, the Defence Innovation Network, Circular Economy Innovation Network and, most recently, the Space Research Network.

R&D NSW is currently engaging with stakeholders to develop a new Network, the Decarbonisation Innovation Hub. Read more about the current and emerging Networks here.

NSW Health Research Portfolio: funding the future of medical research Through the Office for Health and Medical Research, NSW Health spends more than \$100 million a year to support high-quality medical research.

The connectivity of the state's health and medical research sector means that universities are involved in nearly all this research, even where the immediate recipient of funding is another organisation type like a research institute or Local Health District.

Projects that receive funding range from COVID-19 research grants, cell and gene therapy grants, the Medical Devices Fund and the Cardiovascular Research Capacity Program. See more here.

Priority Area 5: Position NSW globally by reinvigorating and diversifying international education and engagement

NSW hosts the largest market share of international students who come to Australia to study (a total of 286,803 students in 2019, representing 38% of international students in Australia). It is the State's largest services export, contributing over \$14.6 billion to the NSW economy in 2019, and supporting over 95,000 full-time equivalent jobs. Funding from international student fees also helps support university research and infrastructure, which benefit communities across NSW.

The NSW Government will work in partnership with higher education institutions to reinvigorate the sector, establishing offshore education-focussed roles in strategic markets under an expanded NSW international network. This work is vitally important because of the significant contribution international students make to NSW's economy and culture.


