Program music – assessment task

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Stage 5

Task number 1	Program music	Weighting
Due:		If the task is not presented on the due date you will receive zero – see the school's assessment policy.

To compose a piece of program music based on an Australian artwork, using music software.

Context for the task:

Students are studying the topic Program Music, particularly music of the 19th Century. Programmatic music is instrumental music that 'tells a story', depicts an object or communicates an idea or emotion, without words. Students will be working on this task in class and are also expected to work on it in their own time.

Outcomes to be assessed:

A student:

- 5.4** demonstrates an understanding of the musical concepts through improvising, arranging and composing in the styles or genre of music selected for study
- 5.6** uses different forms of technology in the composition process

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In this task you will be assessed on:

Your musical effectiveness through:

- a clear and carefully considered composition process as shown by your mind map
- an understanding of the concepts of music as demonstrated in your piece
- effective communication of the artwork in the style of program music
- knowledge and understanding of a music software program.

Task description

- Compose a short piece (1 – 2mins in length) that communicates the ideas, topic or emotion of an Australian artwork. (Your teacher will provide a number of different artworks from which to base your composition).
- Create a mind map to demonstrate your composition ideas and process. This will be submitted as a word doc. with your recording.
- Your composition should demonstrate your understanding of the concepts of music –particularly those we have explored within this topic: dynamics, duration, pitch, texture and tone colour.
- Your composition must be instrumental and have no lyrics/words.
- It should represent the artwork and the ideas in your mind map, as closely as possible.

- It will be composed using a music software program such as GarageBand or Soundtrap www.soundtrap.com
- You will need to **convert it to and/or save it as an mp3**.
- Submit a USB containing a folder consisting of your composition (as an mp3) and mind map (as a word doc.). The folder should be labelled with your name and class.
